The outpouring of support for Pelican Rapids student Faith Westby and her family has continued, not only in Pelican, but throughout the area. Purple is Faith's favorite color and we've seen it in many shapes and forms.



Students and staff have worn t-shirts with the slogan "Everything is possible with FAITH". The Pelican Rapids wrestling team wore purple socks at the Heart O' Lakes conference meet. Even students and athletes at neighboring schools have showed support.

Meanwhile, local businesses have also showed support, such as Petals from the Heart, which is offering special bracelets in honor of Faith and the Westby family. Local residents Joe and Tami Seifert of Long Weekend Sportswear in Perham did priority printing of the "Everything is possible with FAITH" t-shirts with all proceeds going to the Westby family.

Born with Kabuki Syndrome, a genetic mutation that left her with a range of health issues and learning disabilities, the Westby family learned last year that the tumors on her liver had become so threatening that she would need a liver transplant. A call with a donor came in July 2017, but she has faced issues with rejection, as well as other health challenges. She has been receiving hospitalization care in Rochester since early December.

### SMILE is this year's One Word

A new motivational movement is growing more and more energy every year. The movement looks for people to choose a single word to help bring focus and energy to their lives. This "one word" replaces the creation of goals or the making of resolutions.



Author and motivational speaker, Jon Gordon, explains it this way:

"One Word will inspire you to simplify your life and work by focusing on just one word for this year. One Word creates clarity, power, passion and can lead to a life-change. One Word sticks. There is a word meant for you and when you find it, live it, and share it, your life will become more rewarding and exciting than ever.'

Thousands of people as well as hundreds of schools, businesses, churches and sports teams have bought into this motivational technique. Pelican Rapids High School is one of the many institution to jump on the One Word bandwagon.

PRHS started in 2016 with the word Rise. Rise was used to encourage students and staff to help others in life and to personally be more resilient and persevere during tough moments. Be was the school word in 2017. Each student was asked to choose their own One Word with **Be** being the motivation for the entire school; Be Strong – Be Humble – Be Happy. Last year the word was Ignite and the goal was to work to spark a fire in others by being examples of great deeds.

This year, the One Word is SMILE . SMILE is an acronym for Special Moments In Life Exist. The word, along with a logo of a smiley face, are the simple reminder of how powerful we

can be in the lives of others if we just choose to make a difference.

A great example of an event that captured the spirit of SMILE is the "Faith Out" that occurred at the boys' and girls'



basketball double header and how the support for Faith Westby has spread to surrounding communities. Another example is the Empty Bowl fundraiser for the local food shelf. These events create special moments that need to be recognized and celebrated.

People getting recognized will receive a smiley face sticker, a smiley face pin or a specially made smiley face shirt with "Special Moments In Life Exist" printed on the back. The goal is to have a monthly ceremony where we let the students, staff and community know who has SMILED over the past month.

A big push of this year's One Word campaign is to expand it to the elementary, the community of Pelican Rapids and the surrounding area. We want community members to not only be recognized but also to recognize people who they feel deserve a SMILE shout-out.

Dates Closed: Club Vikes is not open on certain holidays (such as Thanksgiving, Christmas, Easter, 4th of July, etc.) You will be reminded of when we are going to be closed.

#### **Contracted Care:**

Mondays/Non-School Days • \$15 (less than 6 hrs) • \$25 (6+hrs)

- Tuesday-Friday/School Days
  - \$3 before school • \$6 after school
  - \$8 before & after school

#### **Drop-In Care:**

- \$3.50/hr with a minimum of \$7 charge (non-school days)
- Drop-ins on school days will be charged contracted care rate
- Child(ren) must be registered.

You do not need to contract any days, you only need to give notice BEFORE you arrive. However, your child is not guaranteed a spot and will only be allowed to attend if there is enough staff to accommodate your child.


### Free Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten for 4 year olds in Pelican Rapids

Research has shown that up to 90% of brain development occurs before the age of five, and that nearly half of Minnesota children enter kindergarten not fully prepared to succeed. By offering every

four-year-old the opportunity to attend preschool, the state hopes to help close the achievement gap and ensure more students have a successful educational career.

Pelican Rapids offers free Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten (VPK) as one of the districts in Minnesota that has been awarded funding for the program.

Viking Elementary Principal Dr. Ed Richardson said that they look at the program as part of a continuum and



getting instruction in letters, numbers, counting and simply how to operate within a school is an important hurdle for kids.

"Kids who come into kindergarten without knowing their letters and numbers

can be behind by the 4th grade. Our Pre-K kids have that exposure to school and know what a school day is. They understand working with other students," said Richardson




Rudy. Because Art - at this highest level - can effectively create positive change, perspective, and empathy, student/artists come forward to read their statements while their personal artwork is

#### PETER SCOTT-2012 GRADUATE

What post-secondary education institution did you attend and what degree did you earn? After graduating high school, I attended MState in Fergus Falls where I earned an associates degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences; graduating in May of 2014. I, then went onto North Dakota State University where I majored in Agribusiness and minored in Crop and Weed Sciences; graduating in December of 2016.







### Driver's Ed parent class this spring The Driver Education classroom program is

part of the 9th grade curriculum at the Pelican Rapids High School offered during the school day. This class prepares students for their instructional permit. After completing a minimum of 30 hours of classroom instruction, the student will be issued a blue card.

Each spring a parent class (Teen Driver Safety Parent Awareness Program) will be scheduled in compliance with Minnesota law. If the parent class is taken then the practice driving hours are reduced from 50 hours to 40 hours.

Once a student has turned 15 and completed the classroom instruction earning a blue card, they are ready to take and pass the state written permit test. Students need to register on-line at https://driverservices. dps.mn.gov/EServices/\_/ and when taking the permit test must provide: one primary ID, one secondary ID and the blue card. Primary ID options: state issued ID, current passport or state certified birth certificate. Secondary ID options: Social Security card, student ID with picture and ID number, or certified school transcript. Upon passing permit test, paying the fee and parent/guardian signature, students receive their permit. Students must have a permit before they can start behind-the-wheel instruction which begins in late April as the snow melts and driving conditions improve. Students sign up with the drivers education teacher at the high school. They are asked to provide contact information and a schedule is arranged. Once they have finished six hours of driving and paid the \$275 fee, they will be issued a white card. Behind-the-wheel instruction must be completed by June 14 due to vehicle and instructor availability. Minnesota law now requires drivers to have a permit for six months before taking the road test. Every driver under the age of 18 who completes behind-the-wheel instruction and is testing for a provisional driver's license must submit a driving log with details of their behind the wheel practice of 40 or 50 hours (depending if a parent attended the Parent Awareness Program meeting). More information will be sent home with students enrolled in Drivers Education class at our school.
