21st Century Skills

I try to keep up on current events and what is happening in the workforce in order to ensure that the Pelican Rapids School District is preparing students for the future. Having said that I have to admit I was a little taken aback to hear that California passed a law to allow autonomous vehicles on state roads and highways. In other words they are allowing driverless cars on the highway. California joined Nevada and

Florida which already have similar laws. This information may be a bit scary but it is also a bit exciting to think of the possibilities of what might be next.

At one time the United States was well known for its innovation and design. In the late 1950s, Sputnik was the big concern and America feared falling behind Russia in the race to the moon. A great deal of pressure came from the President of the United States all the way down to the general public for schools, universities and companies to create, design and innovate to build an infrastructure that would keep our nation on top.

The United States leaped forward under this pressure. The capstone of this era was the accomplishment of putting a man on the moon but there were many other innovations that happened during that time. Our country found new and better ways to strengthen our defense system, our economy and our way of life.

In the 1980's schools began to feel the pressure of standardized tests. The push for innovation was replaced with pressure for the United States to have the highest test scores. In the early years of 2000 uncertain economic times and threats of national security forced us to once again to feel the pressure of global competition. The need to add creation, design and innovation back into schools, universities and companies is once again very strong.

You may hear these skills referred to as the 21st Century Skills and can be summed up with the "Four Cs," Critical Thinking and Problem Solving, Communication, Collaboration and Creativity and Innovation.

So the good news is...the Pelican Rapids Schools is incorporating many of the 21st Century Skills into the daily curriculum for students Pre-K-12th grade. I hope you can grasp the importance of this news. Instead of just mastering core courses the new work force is calling for 21st Century Skills, and the Pelican Rapids Schools are weaving many of these skills into the curriculum.

The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People® and the Leader in MeTM programs, which are new this year, foster collaboration and communication. Critical thinking and problem solving are also evident in many classes. These skills will certainly help our students as they enter the workforce. We continue to keep our eyes on the future and prepare our students for their next steps. Pelican Rapids Schools, We Learn not for School but for Life!



Beginning With the End in Mind

Viking Elementary students and staff have been learning about the 7 Habits of Highly Effective People by Stephen Covey. These habits are intended to promote skills for life and to help develop students into leaders. Habit 2 is the practice to Begin with the End in Mind. Basically, this is the ability to know what it is

you begin. Viking Elementary has been working especially hard on this habit for the last year as we have worked to develop a clear focus for the most important learning outcomes at each grade level.

While all teachers are expected to develop and deliver curriculum based upon Minnesota academic standards, educational research indicates that it would take 23 years to teach all of these standards. If you do a basic math problem, you will quickly recognize that our K-12 system is only 13 years long. Therefore, it is clear that teachers simply cannot cover it all in a meaningful way. Therefore, each grade level has been identifying which reading and math standards are the most essential for ALL students to learn. We call these our Essential Learning Outcomes and teachers share this information with parents and students. When Essential Learning Outcomes are clearly identified, we achieve greater equity across each grade level. Teachers continuously work together to assess student progress towards mastery of these essential outcomes and collaborate on instructional strategies to help students who may be falling behind.

Although we emphasize student learning of these essential learning outcomes, the other standards are still taught. However, we want to provide every student the opportunity to deeply learn what is most important at their grade level. By using a team approach to identify those standards that have the most endurance, leverage, and ability to ready students for the next level of learning, we believe we have a better chance of achieving this goal for ALL students. Beginning with the End in Mind improves our focus on the most essential learning outcomes across grade levels.

•Habit 6: Synergize® Together Is Better



We are so happy and proud to be able to offer some amazing programs for students again this fall! Some of our programs had reached capacity but we were able to add some great student helpers to our staff to assist with all the participants. I will continue to take registrations for our programs throughout the semester as long as we have the staff to cover the activity. You can get registration forms in the elementary office. It is important to note that this year we offered the activities that YOU wanted to see back and, see new. We have, on occasion, sent out surveys to our participants and their parents to get feedback and we've heard some great things and some things that we could improve upon. We value your opinion! Keep the great suggestions coming!

Here are some more amazing opportunities you can find through our school age programming at Viking Elementary. Coming soon-Partnerships with Prairie Wetlands learning center and Maplewood State Park! We have partnered with them in the past and the students have benefited greatly from the experiences! It gives them a chance to get off campus, be a part of and have an impact on the world they live in, and gain new experiences with their friends!

We visited the Buffalo River Pumpkin Patch on October 22nd and we had 58 students participate that day. We are planning another field trip on November 12th to the Perham Area Community Center. Later on in the year we might go to Andes Tower Hills in Alexandria or Skate land in Fargo! We are able to offer these field trips with only a small fee.

Most of our programming this year is offered to you at little to NO cost. There was a huge need from the community to have more free programming and we've been able to offer Magnificent Mondays FREE from 8:00-3:00! There is still a need for supervision during the early morning and late afternoon and our club vikes staff have that covered. We are open at 6:30 am and stay open until 6:00 pm. Club Vikes does come with a small fee, however, this fee can be a burden for some families and we are open to offering a scholarship for students to participate in the extended hours school age care if needed. opportunity that all of our after school participants can take advantage of without missing out on any of the other stuff that's going on. Homework help is offered at 3:45-4:30 in the Library. After 4:30 students can join one of our other activities that are available until 5:15. It is available on a drop in basis as needed, as long as the student has written permission to stay after school. **Science and Engineering Zone:** We use a fun handson curriculum brought to us by NPASS, National Partnerships for Afterschool Science. We spent the first 9 weeks learning about elements of heating a house and an oven. We plan to move into working on paper

Tuesday from 4:00-5:15. Most of the students are 4th-8th grade but K-3 are warmly welcomed. The students choose art projects and media that they want to work with. We also do community art projects such as painting the VES front steps and painting a mural for the outside wall on Mercantile on Main. We have worked with clay, acrylic paint and designer duct tape. The upcoming projects include origami, watercolor and sculpture. We practice first things first. Homework help comes before art projects. Homework can be done during snack break from 3:45-4:00pm.

Club Vikes is our on-site school age care program. If you are in need of some extra hours care for your student this is the place for them. The fees are low, and they receive care from our fun and caring staff. Club Vikes is hosting their 4TH ANNUAL HOLIDAY PARTY on Monday, December 17th, 2012 at 3:45-6:00 in the club vikes room. Anyone is welcome to come!

We started our Monday programming on Monday September 10th. We had a great turn-out. 33 students attended. 10 of them rode the bus that we now are happy to provide through 21st Century Grant funds. We are up to an average daily attendance of about 50 now. 37 of them riding the bus! We offer help with Language skills, computer time, homework help, and enrichment activities. Targeted Services is also available from 9:00-11:30. Both targeted services and 21st Century grant activities offer highly qualified staff to help your student succeed. Our staff is able to incorporate 7 Habits learning as well!

District Goals

"Study the facilities and plan for the future," has been one of the Pelican Rapids School District goals for the last few years. In 2008 Roger Worner completed a thorough review of the finances, demographics, enrollment trends and facilities of the Pelican Rapids School District. Once the report was completed he led a Blue Ribbon Task Force through the findings. This community group was made up of people from various demographic backgrounds. One of the recommendations this group made to the school board was to, "Study the facilities and plan for the future."

The first step of this plan was a review of the elementary building. After a complete study the task force reviewed the findings and recommended to the School Board to move forward and make Viking Elementary energy efficient. That project was completed in 2010. The next step was to have a community task force review the High School in 2010. The School Board made it very clear they were committed to the current site and charged the task force to review the High School building and bring their recommendations to the School Board. When the review was complete the Task Force made a list of recommendations.

The School Board reviewed these recommendations and the impact they would have on safety, education and the community. Rough cost estimates were gathered and the School Board asked the Task Force to prioritize the list. The Task Force prioritized the list, costs were reviewed and the project of 18 million was recommended to the School Board. At the October 16th School Board meeting the School Board made a motion to move forward with the planning phase of this project with the possible date of the referendum to be on or around March 11, 2013

The next few stages will require approval by Minnesota Department of Education. Cost and tax impact will be reviewed and if the School Board chooses to move forward will make a motion late this year. This referendum will be for remodeling of the High School at its current site and is considered a building bond. The debt of a building bond is spread over all property, except where excluded by law. The operating levy tax impact did not include seasonal and agricultural property but the building bond will be spread over seasonal recreation and agricultural land as well as the property with referendum market value, as in the recent operating levy.

High School Building Update

Minnesota State Math League

Pelican Rapids joined both the Minnesota State High School Math League for grades 9-12 and the Minnesota Junior High School Mathematics League for grades 7 and 8 this year.

In Junior High there are 1,383 students competing on 161 teams throughout the state. We are in the West Central division, which



72 individuals on 10 teams. Our kids did well in their first meet, which was held October 3rd. In our division individually Mason Thornton was in a 3-way tie for 2nd place with a 24, and Brooklyn Korynta and Moriah Johnson tied for 5th with 22. In team competition, the Pelican Rapids Vikings team earned 1st place in our division! Team members were 8th graders Mason Thornton, Moriah Johnson, Emma Hoover, Bailey Shulstad, and 7th graders Brooklyn Korynta and Carlan Haugrud. We are looking forward to

The MSHSL senior high math league will start competition on Monday, November 5th.

They will have a chance to earn a trip to state competition both individually and as a team.

Currently there are over 3,000 students from 172 schools participating in the league.

Fourteen individuals from PRHS competed in a separate math contest at Bemidji State University on Tuesday, October 30th. The junior division was for grades 9 & 10, while 11th & 12th graders competed in a senior division.

meet 2, which is coming up on October 31st.

In the junior division Guillermo Rosiles claimed 1st place out of 360 students with a very impressive score of 38 out of 40. Awards are given to the top ten individuals, but it is worth noting that Lincoln Haiby tied for 14th place with a 24, and Kaylee Resch tied for 31st place with a 21. Freshman Logan Knorr was just one point behind her. The average score for competitors in the junior division was 14.4, so all of our kids did far better than average.

Our junior high team dominated the competition by getting 1st place overall out of 24 teams from both division A and AA schools. Team members were Rosiles, Haiby, and Resch. This is the seventh consecutive year that a Pelican Rapids team earned 1st place at this contest!

Johanna Knorr earned 2nd place individually in the senior division with a score of 26. Emma Sjostrom and Reilly Knorr scored 23, which tied for 9th place

individually out of 373 people. Individual awards are not given separately for A & AA schools; all students are in one group. Therefore, it is impressive to place three students in the top ten when competing against kids from larger schools.

Our senior high team consisting of Johanna Knorr, Emma Sjostrom, and Reilly Knorr earned 1st place among A schools, only four points behind AA Bemidji out of 26 teams total.

PRHS has been attending this contest since 2004. During those nine years every team except two that we have brought has earned third place or higher! We have also brought home numerous individual medals every year. Congratulations to our mathletes!

The senior high math team had their first MSHSL math meet on Monday, November 5th. Unfortunately, we only had one Calculus kid and two Pre-Calc kids along, and only ten kids total because many had other commitments. Considering our small numbers, I was pleased with the

results. In Math League, there are four separate tests including Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry/Precalculus, and Analysis. Each student takes two of the tests

and four students from each team



must take each test.

Therefore missing juniors and seniors hurts the team score, as younger kids have to take tests on material they have not learned yet! I am hoping more juniors and seniors can make it to future meets so I don't have to make sophomores take the Calc test again! There is also a team test.

We are competing in the Northwestern Lights division, which includes ten schools. Individually, Guillermo Rosiles tied for third place, Logan Knorr tied for eighth place, and Johanna Knorr tied for 26th out of 239 mathletes.

In team competition, Alexandria achieved first place, Bemidji claimed second, Thief River Falls took third, and Pelican Rapids got fourth place out of ten teams. Team members were Guillermo Rosiles, Logan Knorr, Johanna Knorr, Emma Sjostrom, Lincoln Haiby, Kaylee Resch, Cody Bekkerus, and Josh Kunz. The disappointing part is that last week our math team with more members beat both Bemidji and Thief River Falls at the Bemidji meet. It was amazing that with so few competitors we still beat Breckenridge, Fergus Falls, Detroit Lakes, Moorhead, and others however!

Pelican Rapids Junior High Knowledge Bowl Team Hosts Area Tournament

Last Monday nearly three hundred students from seventeen area schools filled the Pelican Rapids High School participating in a Junior High Knowledge Bowl Tournament. The Pelican Rapids 8th grade team ended up placing in the middle of the competition and members of that team included Drew Cowie, Preston Hart, Mason Thornton, Tianna Wald, Abby Johnson, and Jennessa Ballard.

The Knowledge Bowl season runs from October until April, with junior high teams participating in the fall. There are generally three to four tournaments for junior high participants. In October, the team traveled to Fergus Falls and they will complete their season on December 4 back in Fergus Falls.

Pelican Rapids has hosted a junior high tournament for a number of years. However, the last two years the number of area teams participating has increased from eighteen or twenty teams to more than forty. "Pelican Rapids is centrally located and area teams like Alexandria, Hawley, and Dilworth-Glyndon-Felton like to come," comments Kathy Knuteson-Olson, tournament co-host and former Pelican Rapids coach. "The tournament just seems to keep on growing and we are able to accommodate the large group of kids because the classrooms are not in use on the Monday we schedule the tournament, due to the four day school week," adds Bridgette Holl, tournament co-host and current Pelican Rapids coach.

Knowledge Bowl is sponsored by Lakes Country Service Cooperative. Susan Ward, an academics coordinator for LCSC in Fergus Falls, and her assistant, Monica Thompson, coordinate the tournament schedule and teams. Ward and Thompson provide all questions for both the written and oral rounds, tabulate the results, and present the awards and ribbons at the conclusion of the tournament.

A typical tournament starts with teams competing in a sixty question written round. Following the written round, students take a break, resuming competition with a series of four oral rounds. Students continue to compete based on their written test score. Three teams compete in each round using electronic strips that record which team buzzes in first. Following each oral round of forty-five questions, teams are ranked again based on the score of each round. Teams rearrange themselves and float from room to room, based on their rank after each round of competition.

Competition concludes with an awards ceremony. Teams are recognized for their rank, but also for special achievements. For example, history questions may be identified throughout the written and oral rounds. A team may be recognized for how well they do on history questions only. Another example is when a team is recognized for making large gains in the ranking because they score average in the written round, but really score well in the series of oral rounds.

The knowledge bowl team practices daily. Members of the team practice with written round questions or participate with mock oral round questions recycled from tournament play in earlier competition.

Practice will begin with the Senior High Knowledge Bowl team the first week in December. The senior high team also practices daily, but attends more tournaments. At the conclusion of the season, the senior high team competes at the sub-region, region, and state level depending on their performance.

PRHS Lighthouse Team Helps Create "7 Habits" Leadership Model

A component of carrying out the "Leader in Me" program in the high school was the creation of a Lighthouse Team. The Lighthouse Team is a group of teachers and administrators who meet regularly and oversee school wide implementation of the "7 Habits of Successful Teens". Engaging students, staff, parents, and community members in the school's leadership model is a key goal for this group.

Another important aspect of the Lighthouse team is to support ongoing staff development in the "Leader in Me" process. A big part of that focus has been creating a leadership environment throughout the school building. We want the school itself to reinforce the leadership model we want to instill in our students. Below is a list of things that the Lighthouse Team has been doing so far to start the process of developing leaders at PRHS:

- Teachers were reintroduced to the 7 Habits during fall workshops.
- New Staff was trained prior to the start of the fall workshops.
- Students were introduced to the 7 Habits during first day assembly
- Teachers were asked to display the PRHS mission statement:

- The board room was refreshed and reorganized to reflect the commitment that the school has towards the 7 Habits.
- Posters displaying the 7 Habits will be displayed in all classrooms.
- We are currently working on developing signs that reinforce aspects of the 7 Habits to be displayed in and outside the school.
- A presentation was done on November 13th to introduce the 7 Habits to the community.
- A classroom set of "The 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens" by Sean Covey were ordered and are being read in the Social Science classrooms.
- The morning announcements switched over from principal controlled to student led live television broadcasts that will be streamed through computers and watched by first hour classes.



• Staff members at PRHS all purchased a "Be the Water" shirt to demonstrate our commitment to Habit 1 – Be Proactive. Being proactive is understanding that "I control Me" which was printed on the back of the shirts.

The process of implementing the "Leader in Me" philosophy is not something that will occur in the blink of an eye. The school will take baby steps over the next couple of years as students, staff, administration and parents learn how to use the 7 Habits to grow a successful environment. Old habits are hard to break, new paradigms need to be created and students

need to learn how to live a "principle" centered lives.

This is an exciting time of change and renewal at the high school. Students and staff are being asked to look at who they are in a more focused-result driven way. The focus is on creating a better "individual" by ultimately creating better core habits. We start by establishing strong roots with the first three habits; Being Proactive, Beginning with the End in Mind, and Putting First Things First. After we win the private



victory of taking charge of our lives, we move on to the next three habits that ask us to win a public victory by; Thinking Win-Win, Seeking to Understand and Synergizing. It is in these three habits that true leadership is shown. The PRHS Lighthouse team looks to keep this excitement flowing for years to come.

The following is a list of goals that we are working to meet:

- 1. Meet regularly and oversee school-wide implementation of the leadership model.
- 2. Get the school campus' environment to reemphasizes individual worth and leadership principles.
- 3. Help teachers integrate leadership language into school curriculum and instruction daily.
- 4. Help the staff collaborate and work together to effectively build a culture of leadership in classrooms and throughout the school.
- 5. Make sure students are provided with meaningful student leadership roles and responsibilities.
- 6. Help the parents of students understand "The Leader in Me" model and the "7 Habits" and be involved in activities that support the leadership model.
- 7. Put a system in place for setting and tracking school-wide, classroom, academic and personal goals.

6A meet. They became the first cross country team from Pelican Rapids to qualify for the state meet where they finished in 12th place.



Individually, the Vikings boasted six All-Conference runners, four All-Section runners and one All-State runner. Emily Bakken was the Individual Conference Champ and Cody Bekkerus won the individual title at the prestigious Milaca Mega Meet. Cody was also named to the All-State team.

The Pelican Rapids volleyball team ended with a successful season with an overall record of 17-8 and 3-3 in the HOL conference. The Vikings took first place in the Pelican Rapids Invitational and fourth in the Fergus Falls Invitational. One of the many highlights was beating Perham for the first time in 27 years. The volleyball team was also seeded fourth in section 8AA, which gave the Vikings a home playoff game. The Vikings had two All-Conference players and two All-Conference Honorable Mention.

The football team ended the season with a record of 7-3. The Vikings wins came against Breckenridge, Warroad, Staples, East Grand Forks, Roseau, DGF, and Prairie Valley. School Board Changes

"I have learned a lot about our school during my years as a school board member, education is constantly changing and complex.



After School Programs Help Youth of All Ages

Middle School Youth and Their Families Need Afterschool Programs

Most families with children in the U.S. today need some type of afterschool services. The parents of 28 million children work outside the home. Nearly 4 million middle school youth are unsupervised afterschool. The conventional wisdom is that by the time children reach middle school, they are old enough to take care of themselves and adult

supervision is not as critical as it was when they were in elementary school. However, if left to their own devices, these young adolescents might not make the best use of the free time they have after school. In spite of the autonomy they may be given, middle school age youth need guidance and adult supervision to help keep them safe, engaged in school, and on the path to success in life.

The Benefits of After-School Programs and Homework Help

- 1. Provides supervision for parents who cannot regularly be with their children.
- 2. Programs and tutoring keep children away from trouble
- 3. Improves personality and maturity.
- 4. Children get along better with other children as well as adults.
- 5. Provides children with prompt feedback on activities they regard as important.
- 6. Gives children additional certified adult guidance.
- 7. Helps develop self-confidence.
- 8. Helps youth to be more self-sufficient.
- 9. Children have fun.
- 10. Kids can learn more through after school programs and tutoring.

Afterschool Program: Supporting Career and College Pathways

Afterschool programs offer a key opportunity to expose students to higher education and career path options and to teach them skills that can unlock doors to future career prospects. During the afterschool hours, there is time for apprenticeships, guest speakers, college mentoring and project-based activities that are not always available during a school day focused on the core curriculum. Afterschool programs better prepare middle school youth for high school, college and careers, while also keeping them on track and engaged in school.

Middle School and Science Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM)

The information economy of the twenty-first century is creating more jobs that require not only a college education, but also at least some expertise in the fields of science, technology, engineering and math, collectively known as STEM. In order to stay competitive in the global market-place and provide our children with the best opportunity to succeed, we must get more students on the STEM path. Combining STEM learning with afterschool programming offers middle school students a fun, challenging, hands on introduction to the skills they will need in high school, college and the workplace. STEM afterschool programs for middle school youth give students time to develop an interest in STEM and inspire them to learn. Join the club "Get Sparked" offered every Wednesday after school.

Volunteer Mentor Program and the Fall Cleanup

This fall the Volunteer mentor Program did a trial run for a community cleanup. One cold rainy Monday we helped to haul some dirt for a flower bed then cleaned up a garden so it would be ready for spring. As I mentioned before this was a trial run.
